

Lieutenant Colonel Greg Tomlin is a career combat arms officer in the U.S. Army. He presently commands a cannon artillery battalion at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, near Tacoma, Washington. Most recently he served as chief of the Targeting Doctrine and Policy Branch, Directorate for Intelligence, the Joint Staff at the Pentagon.

Colonel Tomlin entered the army in 2001 as a distinguished military graduate of the College of William and Mary's Reserve Officer Training Program. He served as a peacekeeper in Kosovo, a rifle platoon leader and military advisor in Iraq, and he commanded field artillery units in Germany, the Republic of Korea, and Fort Bliss, Texas. He also served as a White House Military Social Aide during the Obama administration.

Colonel Tomlin earned a PhD in diplomatic history from the George Washington University and served as assistant professor of history at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, where he earned the History Department's top teaching award in 2013. He coauthored *The Gods of Diyala: Transfer of Command in Iraq* and authored *Murrow's Cold War: Public Diplomacy for the Kennedy Administration*. His most recent articles in *Military Review* and *Joint Force Quarterly* focus on the military's use of Information Operations.
